Black History Week

During Black History week Year 4 researched the life of Matthew Henson, an African American, who is claimed as the first to reach the geographic North Pole in 1909. Year 5's chosen character was Mae Jemison, the first black woman in space.



Year 6 chose Katherine Johnson, whose calculator –like brain was pivotal in calculating the trajectory for landing the first flight to the moon.

It was great to see the children researching the important contributions these people have made.

KS1 Fire of London Day

In the Spring term, KS1 had a Fire of London experience day, where they dressed up in the clothes of the time and learned about life in the 1600s. This included writing using the implements of the time, jobs that people had and some of the food. Upon speaking with the children after the event, I was very impressed with their knowledge of dates, the causes of the fire and the actions taken to prevent it happening again.

Throughout the school, we try and include activity days, such as these, as the children learn so much and have fun while they are doing it!



Year 4 Lincolnsfield Trip

The topic in Year 3 and 4 for this term has been Dig For Victory, learning how children 's lives were affected during the Second World War. Our trips to Lincolnsfield in Bushey, take the children back in time. They experience learning in a 1940's classroom, look through a 1940's house and some of the toys children had, and about the chores children did to help at home. We have also looked




at food rationing and learning how different food in the 1940s was when comared to a modern menu.
