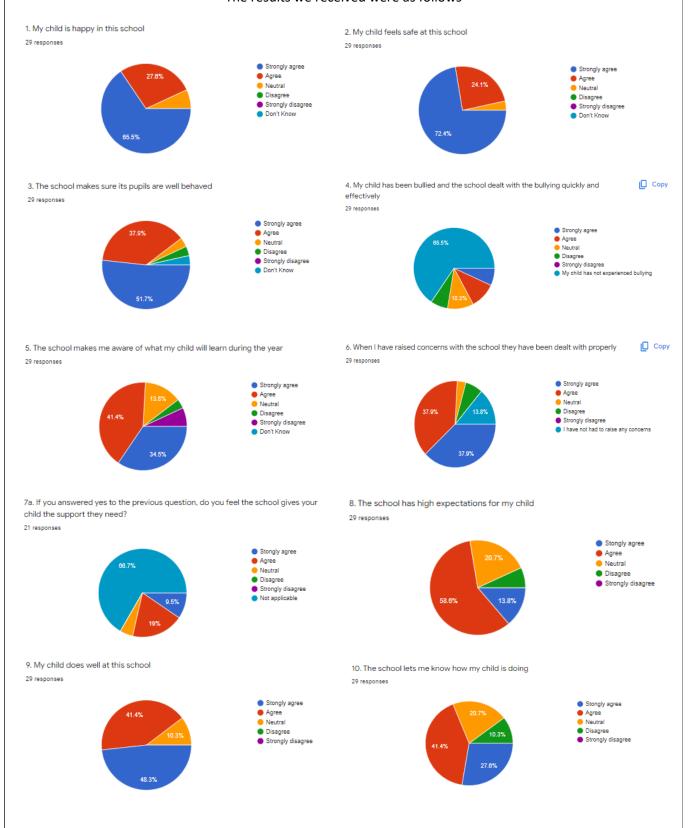

Thank you to the 29 people who responded to our parent survey. Your feedback is really useful and we have already started to work on how we can improve things in school.

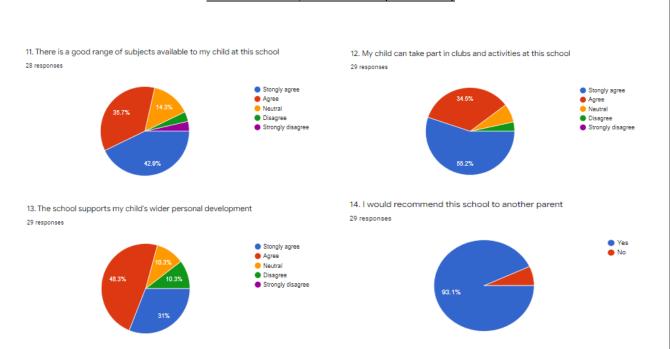
#### The results we received were as follows







#### Parent View - Questionnaires (Continued)



Overall, I am pleased that so many of the responses were positive. Unfortunately, where some parents have disagreed there have not been reasons why so it has made it more difficult to understand and we have been left trying to work out what we need to do to make things better.

It may be that due to COVID and the restrictions we have had in place parents are feeling less of a connection with the school and I can understand this.

On question 5, regarding parents being made aware of what the children are learning. Currently at the start of each term you receive a leaflet stating what the children will be learning over the year. On the curriculum pages on the website there are also comprehensive overviews for each subject stating what is being learnt. At the end of the term we also send home (from Y1-Y6) a report showing how well the children have performed in key areas. This is in addition to the parents evening which is held in the Autumn and the Spring. We have also held maths parent workshops to help parents understand the curriculum and how concepts are taught.

If at any point you feel you need to find out more information or you have a concern, you can make an appointment to see your child's class teacher. Unfortunately it is not sustainable to offer additional formal parents meetings throughout the year or have more than 10minutes per parent.

I was also surprised to see some disagreement over Q11 and what subjects are available to the children. As a school we ensure that all areas of the curriculum are covered. We never remove an area to give more time to English and Maths as we believe that the children are entitled to a balanced curriculum. This has continued throughout COVID. We also have specialist teaching for music, PE and French ensuring our children have access to the highest quality of learning. Again no reasons for the disagree statements so it is hard to understand what parents feel they would like but I would be happy to discuss this further if anyone could shed some light on why they have disagreed or why they feel another parent may have done so.

It is sad that 3 parents would not recommend our school. I am so proud of the school community we have grown and every single person works hard to ensure we are doing the best by our children. Again, without any reasons we are left wondering.

Finally, can I say a massive thank you to these parents who took the time to end with a positive message. These messages are always very well received. As always, we will continue to do the best we can by your children.

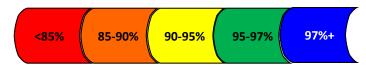




## Attendance Matters

We think that it is important that children are in school, on time, every day. We aim for our whole school attendance to be above 96% but ideally 97% and as many children as possible to have 100% attendance. The reason for this is because children who attend school every day are more likely to learn more, have more friends and get a good job when they are older. To give your children the best chances and opportunities, they must be in school. We will happily support you if you are having a problem getting your child into school but we can only do this if we are aware of what the problem is!

Clearly we are in difficult times when it comes to attendance with some absences being out of our control. As we try to get back to a more normal way of working though, it is important that children are in school as this is the only way we can help them catch up. You can check your child's attendance on the Gateway app.
